

Year 11 Photography students are currently working towards their final GCSE 10 hour exam. Students are required to fulfil 4 assessment objects during a preparation period prior to the exam, the exam is the opportunity for students to fully 'Show Off' their skills and complete very high quality, often stunning, final outcomes. Assessment Objective 1 asks students to study the work of Photographers, analysing and evaluating their work; the style, narrative, composition, use of lighting etc. One of the most effective ways in which GCSE students learn from Professional Photographers is in the re-creations that they undertake.



A* target Klaudia Osmaelk selected the starting point 'Out of Place' from the AQA GCSE Photography exam paper, she had a choice of 7 possible starting points.

The Surrealist movement has inspired photographers such as Tommy Ingberg and Anya Steigler to create seemingly impossible combinations of scenes or objects using digital processes. In his series 'Out of Place' Robert Rickhoff digitally manipulates photographs to create scenes using illogical, unlikely combinations and positions of objects.

Klaudia has studied Tommy Ingberg and you can see here how she undertook a number of Photographic 'Shoots' to put together in postproduction a re-creation of one of Ingberg's images. Using Adobe Photoshop Klaudia has then started to skilfully edit and build, via layers her imagery, starting with the background of the sky then added the figure and fists. I think you will agree that the outcome is amazing and a stunning pastiche of the Photographers. Well done Klaudia!

Small Faces Exhibition Peoples Portrait Project Solent Showcase Gallery My Entry Title: Pepper




For my Small Face portrait I decided for it to be a self-portrait and to use the media of spray paint with a single stencil. The project didn't take long and it didn't need to as the exhibition is primarily about creativity and individualism. It could have been abstract or photographic, the only thing that mattered was the face. I created the spray paint by firstly taking a range of pictures then deciding onwhich one I was to use based on the lighting and what kind of facial expression I wanted. Then I printed it of and began to cut out the significantly dark or defined parts of the portrait remembering to use an A6 sized photo on the paper. For this I'd recommend using Microsoft Publisher as you can scale your pictures. After this I began to bring in my spray paint.

I stuck my paper down onto a wooden board using masking tape and gave it a first spray of white for a clear effect. The "Pepper" effect, as I call it, was achieved by then using black in dashes across the page and then going over it in white again. This is how I came up with the name as well as the funny fact that my pet cat,

Michael Craig-Martin's is not a household name, yet it is entirely likely that most of us will have owned at least one image made by him. Students spent a lesson studying his drawings and larger works and then went on to create their own large scale drawings, in the case with coloured tape on the floors and windows of the Art Department! On Thursday 16th February, Barton Peveril College held its first ever German Day. It was attended by over one hundred enthusiastic Students and their teachers from a number of local secondary schools. The Wildern School team comprised Year 10 students: Emma Sanders, Alice Robbins, Alex Shepherd, Izzie Grogan and Nathan Shorrocks.

This event was designed to promote the profile of German as an important school subject, and to encourage greater student uptake at Advanced Level and university. Funding and support for the event were given by the Goethe Institut, the educational wing of the German embassy.

The day started in the lecture theatre with a greeting from the college Assistant Principal. This was followed by a number of quick-fire workshops, each highlighting the relevance of German and linguistic competence in respect to work, culture and internationalism.

During the mid-morning break, Students were treated to German-style doughnuts, known as Berliner. This was the time to tell the historical anecdote of President John F Kennedy's speech in 1963 at The Berlin Wall when he famously assumed the identity of a sweet bun with the line 'Ich bin ein Berliner'!

In the second half of the morning, Students worked in small groups on the main task of the day: to create a short advert marketing a soft drink for a German-speaking audience. The relevance of this challenge could be found in the words of the former German chancellor, Willy Brandt, who once said: "If I am selling to you, I speak your language. If I am buying, dann müssen sie Deutsch sprechen."

Each group of five Students worked keenly on using its German language skills to best effect, ensuring that their product's unique selling point was effectively communicated. Various props and costumes assisted their efforts. The final performance was captured on a short video-clip.

After such hard work, Students were ready for to check out the promise of a German-style lunch. Parked just outside the canteen area, they found a food van attended by an authentic German vendor selling authentic German sausages. Five hungry Wildern students and their teacher tucked into Bratwurst, bread roles and German condiments.

After an hour of food and conversation, Students returned to the lecture theatre for the final part of the day. Each video-clip produced in the session before lunch was shown to an appreciative audience, enjoying some great acting and German selling lines. The three expert judges marked each performance on its linguistic and artistic merit.

And then the judges were ready to announce the results. And first prize goes to Wildern School! Our winning advert had included such memorable lines as 'Man hat gesagt, dass dieses Getränk atemberaubend ist.' ('It has been said that this drink is breathtaking.') and 'Ich werde wieder jung sein.'('I will be young again'), which included a few comical outtake moments for our one male actor, Nathan Shorrocks!

Our five prize-winning students returned home with a sense of pride in their foreign language skills and an appreciation of the importance of having a second language.
