

I hope you enjoy reading the following newsletter, which as always is full of exciting articles and updates on the activities of this term, and there have been many. I have included as much as I can in my monthly blog. The first half of the term was brought to a brilliant end with the annual school production of Annie: what an amazing show. It was so professional that it could have been part of the West End schedule. Thanks to all those parents who wrote in congratulating the cast and team behind it; all of them were passed on. By the time you read this we will have had our celebration of dance and our annual Christmas concert: one of my favourites.

The start of the second half of the term saw Year 11 undertake their practice exams. This is a stressful time but they managed it well with a maturity we have come to expect from this year group. Following their exam fortnight they have returned to their studies and some timetable changes with focus and rigour. Well done to all of them.

As many of you will be aware, we were successful with our Free School application for Horton Heath Primary and Secondary schools, although there are proposed potential location changes. All of the work will be carried out in close collaboration with Hampshire County Council, who are currently exploring the option of a new site for the secondary school building. Feasibility work is currently being undertaken to look at the option of relocating the new school onto land under County Council ownership at Woodhouse Lane. This land is currently being considered for a wider educational and residential development through the Eastleigh Local Plan process. This option for the secondary school is being proposed to ensure delivery of the additional secondary school places and will be subject to agreement with the local planning authority. We will keep you posted with our progress and any future meetings. What is positive is that we will continue to provide places for all linked primary schools.

In addition to this project we have a further application in for approval with the Department of Education for a two form entry primary school at Boorley Green. We are awaiting notification of an interview and hopefully a successful outcome. More will follow on this.

Finally as many of you are aware we run a School Centred Initial Teacher Training programme at the school in partnership with many schools in the area both primary and secondary. We recently had the final part of a two stage Ofsted inspection of our training provision. It was an excellent outcome. When the report has been finalised it will be available as a link on the school website for those parents wishing to read it.

Can I, as always, end by thanking you for your unfailing support and the good wishes I so often receive about our students and the work we are doing. I wish you all a fabulous Christmas and new year.



Five lucky Wildern students also had the opportunity to participate in The Berry's production of 'The Tempest' on 17th November along with students from Hounsdown and Toynbee School.



THE PARTNER SCHOOL

On a beautifully hot and sunny late September day, Team Wildern landed at Stuttgart airport and made the short train transfer to Eastleigh's twin-town, Kornwestheim. In our party were thirty-six Wildern School athletes from Years 8 and 10, proudly led by the linguist Mr Horton, the athlete Mr Pike and the all-rounder Miss Stride. We were about to take part in an Olympic-style sporting extravaganza, hosted by our partner school, the Ernst Sigle Gymnasium, and attended by three hundred youngsters from schools in Germany, Spain, France and England.

On Thursday 29th September all the teams gathered in the foyer of the town hall to be greeted by the mayor of Kornwestheim, Dietmar Allgaier. Before making his speech, the Mayor invited Mr Horton to interpret his words into English and then into Spanish for the international guests. Contemplating a future career in the United Nations assembly, Mr Horton, took the microphone and pulled off a running multi-lingual translation. The Mayor's speech highlighted the way in which sport fosters international understanding, bringing together so many people from different countries and cultures. He keenly anticipated four days of intense but harmonious sporting competition.

On Friday morning, all athletes and spectators met at the main sports arena in Kornwestheim. Following the entertaining performance of an Abba medley by the German school band, there were some short speeches, including one from the visiting Mayor of Eastleigh, Cllr. Des Scott. Then a student from each country took to the podium and read out the Olympic oath in the respective languages. Well done to Wildern's Holly Wookey who had learnt her words and did not need a script. Finally, the Olympic flame was lit and a great cheer went up as the event was declared officially open by the host school's Headteacher, Christoph Mühltaler.

In the first event, Year 8 sprinter, Emily Eades Scott, raced to an emphatic victory in the 100 metres and earned Wildern the first gold medal of the games. Luke Pardoe and Maddie Cooper also ran their way to Gold in the 800 metres. Our powerful relay teams cleaned up gold medals in three of the four age groups. The climax to the Year 10 boys' relay was particularly memorable with Jack Renshaw running a fantastic final leg with skill and determination.

Away from the running track, Year 8 student, Harry Crosby was causing gasps of astonishment from the crowd as he won Gold in both Long Jump and High Jump, outjumping his own height with a Personal Best. The day ended with the volleyball tournament in the local sports halls. This was not our strongest event, but the Year 10 boys did still secure a Bronze medal.

For the second day, the focus shifted to the municipal swimming baths with Team Wildern confident of its female potential in the pool. Our early optimism was soon rewarded as Year 10 girls Izzie Grogan and Katie Osborne glided their way to gold medals. This success was matched by the Year 8 girls with Gold performances from Izzie Hinkley and Lydia Parker. Our girls relay teams in each year group also gained gold medals.

The final day of competition began in the sports hall with basketball, where the Year 8 boys and girls teams both won hard-fought Bronze medals. It was then onto one of our more favoured events, football. After some feisty group matches, our boys' chance of success hinged on that very familiar scenario: a penalty shoot-out against the Germans. Just like Waddle and Southgate before them, there were tears of disappointment as our national nightmare continued. Our much-fancied Year 10 boys settled for a Silver medal, an achievement matched by the Year 8 girls.

And so, after three long days of sporting competition, it was time to change out of our sports kit and head to the school hall for the awards ceremony and post-event party. We stood and waited with baited breath as German PE teacher and event organiser, Marc Rudolf-Wolke, announced the final medals table. The host school had won with a total of 18 gold medals, but Team Wildern came a very respectable third with 16 Golds. We had also claimed nine silver and ten bronze medals.

As the music started, and Harry Crosby was thrown into the air by the same Spanish boys much fancied by our year 10 girls, it was time to start enjoying the beat of a massive Euro-disco.

As we reflected on four wonderful days in Germany, it was clear just how much sport had, as promised, promoted international understanding. Many Wildern students had struck up friendships with others from Germany, France or Spain, which they would continue on social media. Those students learning a foreign language at school had enjoyed the opportunity to try out their linguistic skills.

Our young athletes arrived back home with some sweet memories and medals to treasure for a lifetime.







D. J. Brazier Book Review - Alone by D. J. Brazier


